

How does the \$200 billion cost of the Iran war reshape long-term fiscal accountability and geopolitical power structures for US strategic stability?

Executive Summary

The \$200 billion cost of the Iran war significantly reshapes long-term US fiscal accountability by institutionalizing deficit-financed defense prioritization and structurally crowding out productivity-enhancing domestic investments. Concurrently, evidence suggests it has permanently fractured transatlantic and Gulf security coordination, accelerating a shift towards a multipolar security order where allies pursue independent defense and diplomatic channels, thereby degrading US strategic stability.

Key Findings

Long-Term Fiscal Accountability and Debt Burden

The \$200 billion cost of the Iran war represents a permanent institutional shift toward deficit-financed defense prioritization rather than a temporary cyclical spike [3]. This is driven by multi-year industrial expansion, decades-long veteran care liabilities, and entrenched congressional spending habits [3, 6]. The total cumulative cost is projected to reach \$1 trillion when accounting for reconstruction, inventory rebuild, and long-term veteran care [3, 13, 14].

- **Structural Deficit Financing:** Replenishing military assets, such as high-end US missiles, requires a long-term capital commitment, with replacement times extending up to six years [10, 13]. To meet sustained consumption rates, the US has signed multi-year contracts with defense suppliers like Lockheed Martin and Boeing to scale interceptor production, an industrial expansion projected to cost hundreds of billions over several years [3]. Lockheed Martin is scaling interceptor production from approximately 600 to 2,000 annually and THAAD interceptors from 96 to 400 annually [3].
- **Permanent Fiscal Liabilities:** The war establishes a permanent fiscal liability for veteran care, with approximately 55,000 deployed troops exposed to toxins and environmental hazards, making them eligible for lifetime disability compensation and

medical care under the PACT Act [3, 13, 15]. This adds to an existing \$7.3 trillion in owed disability benefits from previous wars [3].

- **Crowding Out Domestic Investments:** The Congressional Budget Office projected that even before this war, deficits were set to exceed 6% of GDP, and public debt would surpass World War II levels by 2030 [7]. A large military spending increase could more than triple the existing 1.5% fiscal gap, turning federal debt into an intractable problem [12]. Congress has demonstrated a structural inability to decline defense appropriations, with the 2026 defense budget already reaching \$1 trillion before the war began [6]. This permanent prioritization of defense crowds out flexible discretionary domestic investments like healthcare, childcare, education, and infrastructure [6].

- **Specific Program Cuts:** The FY27 budget proposes an \$87.6 billion emergency supplemental for the Iran war, offset by proposed 10% cuts (\$73 billion) to non-defense discretionary programs [1, 3, 8, 18]. Specific reductions include zeroing out the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) (\$4.05 billion) and the Weatherization Assistance Program (\$369 million) [18]. Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) funding is proposed to decrease from \$107.5 billion to \$101.2 billion [19]. Significant cuts are also proposed for the Department of Energy's EERE programs (\$1.9 billion), EPA funding (52%), drinking water and sewer infrastructure (\$2.5 billion), K-12 education (over \$6 billion), NIH (\$5.75 billion to \$6 billion), CDC (\$2.9 billion), and the National Science Foundation (\$4.8 billion) [1, 4, 18].

- **Compounded Economic Strain:** The war has actively degraded the federal revenue base through compounded inflationary pressure and rising Treasury yields. The closure of the Strait of Hormuz, which handles 20% of global oil and natural gas, triggered a severe energy and food price shock [5, 7]. In May 2026, inflation hit a three-year high of 4.2%, and gasoline prices reached \$4.48 per gallon, surging over 40% from the previous year [8]. Concurrently, 10-year Treasury bond yields rose by approximately 30 basis points to 4.25%, increasing borrowing costs for the government, businesses, and households [7, 8]. However, these external economic shocks remain secondary to Congress's structural decision to prioritize defense appropriations over domestic monetary stabilization [6].

Reshaping Geopolitical Power Structures

The Iran war has permanently fractured transatlantic and Gulf alliances, forcing European and Middle Eastern partners toward independent security and diplomatic channels, thereby structurally shifting geopolitical power away from a centralized US alliance

network [13].

- **Transatlantic Alliance Erosion:** The conflict caused the "deepest damage" to the transatlantic alliance [13]. Major European powers acted unilaterally or in opposition to US operations, with Spain closing its airspace, France blocking US and Israeli aircraft, Germany declaring neutrality, and the UK initially refusing base access [13]. The US also postponed Foreign Military Sales deliveries to Baltic and Scandinavian NATO members [13]. This has led to a significant erosion of trust, which "does not mend quickly" [13].

- **Gulf Security Architecture Fracture:** The war exposed the fragility of Washington's security umbrella for Gulf partners [13]. Iran now exercises an unprecedented degree of control over the Strait of Hormuz, imposing a de facto toll regime that has forced countries like India and Pakistan to negotiate passage directly with Tehran [13].

- **US Strategic Insolvency and Reliability:** The diversion of advanced interceptors, strategic bombers, and carrier assets to the Middle East left Ukraine under-supplied and the Indo-Pacific under-resourced [13, 16]. This resource drain weakened allied security and raised fundamental questions about US reliability, compelling European and Middle Eastern allies to build independent diplomatic channels and pursue autonomous defense procurement [13, 16].

- **Sino-Russian-Iranian Operational Alignment:** This deepening alignment represents a durable structural shift toward a multipolar security order, driven by shared interests in exploiting US "strategic insolvency" [13, 16]. Russia and China actively coordinated to support Iran, providing intelligence, military supplies, and economic aid [13, 16]. Russia benefited from elevated oil prices and Western distraction from Ukraine, while China secured preferential passage through the Strait of Hormuz and acted as Iran's largest oil buyer [8, 13, 16, 17]. This alignment creates the potential for a two-front challenge for Washington if China escalates in the Taiwan Strait and South China Sea [16, 17].

- **Middle Eastern and Gulf Realignment:** Gulf states have accelerated investments in cyber deterrence and indigenous AI capabilities [20]. Saudi Arabia expanded defense cooperation with Pakistan and Turkey, formalized by a mutual defense pact in September 2025 [21]. Gulf states are actively diversifying beyond the US, with Saudi Arabia and the UAE acceding to BRICS and Bahrain applying in October 2024 [6, 11, 17]. They are deepening defense ties with France, the UK, South Korea, Turkey, Russia, and China to reduce reliance on the American military system [20]. This accelerates a shift from US unipolarity to a fragmented, multi-centric environment where Gulf states assert strategic

autonomy [2, 7, 9, 11, 20, 22].

Impact on US Strategic Stability

The fiscal and geopolitical shifts directly impact US strategic stability by creating capability gaps and altering the political calculus for future interventions.

- **Industrial Capacity Bottlenecks:** The rapid depletion of munitions, such as the potential exhaustion of the entire US interceptor inventory in four to five weeks, highlights severe manufacturing bottlenecks [13]. While contractors like Lockheed Martin are scaling production, this industrial expansion "will take years" and replacing expended high-end missiles could take up to six years [3, 10, 13]. This creates a period of "strategic insolvency" where the US is materially depleted while needing to maintain deterrence across multiple theaters [13, 16].
- **Altered Foreign Policy Calculus:** The financial costs of expending multi-billion dollar interceptor stockpiles, coupled with the fiscal strain and industrial limitations, will likely raise the strategic threshold for initiating military interventions abroad compared to historical lower-cost conflicts.

Implications

The \$200 billion cost of the Iran war has profound implications for US strategic stability. It signals a structural erosion of US fiscal flexibility, as future federal revenue streams are increasingly locked into defense replenishment and debt servicing, thereby weakening the long-term economic growth necessary to sustain global leadership. Geopolitically, the war has accelerated the fragmentation of the US-led alliance system, compelling traditional partners to pursue strategic autonomy and fostering a more multipolar security order. This diminished capacity and fractured alliance network will likely constrain US foreign policy options, raising the bar for future military interventions and increasing the assertiveness of rival powers and regional actors.

Limitations and Caveats

The report's conclusions are drawn from a complex interplay of fiscal and geopolitical factors, with some inherent uncertainties. Specific projected annual deficit increases directly attributable to the \$200 billion cost over the next decade are not precisely quantified in the available research, beyond general CBO projections for overall deficits.

Furthermore, the research does not specify the estimated monetary value of independent defense procurement contracts signed by European or Gulf nations with non-US suppliers since the conflict began. The assessment of industrial capacity bottlenecks, while indicating multi-year replacement timelines, lacks specific details on component supplier shortages or pre-war lead times. The overall confidence in the debate verdict is moderate, reflecting the complex causal relationships and the difficulty in isolating a singular cause for such wide-ranging impacts.
